"How long have you attended AFBC?"

I've attended AFBC for 41 years. I was invited to attend by Chris Stanton, who was a prominent member of the church, and was in

one of my classes at HSU. I came from Orange County in Southern California in 1973 to attend what was then called Humboldt State University. I received my Bachelor of Arts degree in Industrial Arts and went on to get a Master of Arts degree in Industrial Education. I also got a secondary and primary teaching credential.

"What was your career prior to becoming the AFBC Facilities Manager and how long did you work there?"

One of my biggest testimonies was how I ended up teaching at Ferndale High School. Shortly after I finished college, I came back to the Lord, started attending AFBC, got baptized, and was really trying to follow the Lord to the best of my ability. During college I had established a business in my shop. I built houses, drew house plans, built cabinets, furniture, custom doors, and windows. God very clearly told me to let my shop go. "What is your favorite part of your job?"

I can't tell you how meaningful and rich it is to be working at Church, looking at what God has provided for us, and praising His name. While I work, I pray for the people, the buildings, the grounds, those who went before us, standing in awe of

SOLID ROCK/GENT FAMILY SUMMER MISSION TRIP

Daniel Gent here,

As you may recall, Claire and I lived two years in the Kurdish region of Iraq. This summer we plan to go back to visit the friends and ministries with which we developed connections. We also plan to visit the

Silva family in Kosovo. We'll be accompanied by our children and Patricia Gent, and for portions of the trip we'll be joined by Paul Stiles, Jessica Day, and Jackson Wysock from Solid Rock.

Kurdish Iraq

The Kurdish region of Iraq has been self-governing since the first gulf war (Saddam Hussein, George Bush Sr. Era). It has a sizable Christian minority, which grew as the chaos in Iraq proper led to internal displacement. The city we will be visiting, Erbil, had a population of approximately 50 thousand at the time of the first gulf war, but was pushed close to two million at the height of ISIS power. Since the start of self-government, a number of churches and schools have been started. We plan to meet with students, both Christian and Muslim, and friends from our time there.

- Classical School of the Medes, the school in which I taught for two years, is around 25 years old.
- The Hive, a newly planted elementary school primarily started for families ministering through the international church.
- Erbil International Baptist Church, the church we attended during our stay in Iraq.

Kosovo

Kosovo was granted self-government in the presidency of Bill Clinton. It is a Muslim majority country in the Slavic region of Europe. While it is not currently a member of NATO or the EU it hopes to join both. Jenny and Jordan Silva (Jenny is Claire's sister) have been living in Kosovo for the past several years reaching out to local university students. God has opened an effective door of ministry here, and the Silva's are in the process of planting a church.

Prayer Points

Both Kosovo and Kurdish Iraq are on the periphery of wider conflicts (Iran-Israel & Description of Wider Conflicts). Pray that the church in these regions would walk wisely in assurance of being held in His hand.

Both Kosovo and Kurdish Iraq are Muslim majority but uniquely open to the gospel. Pray that the witness of the church would be effective and turn many to righteousness.

Both Kosovo and Kurdish Iraq are increasingly coming under the pressure of wester cultural immorality. Current culture is not terribly different than the US in the 70-80s. Pray that the church would stand against porn, divorce, hook-up culture, and all the derivatives that inevitably follow from these.

Pray the harvest which is plentiful would be met with abundant laborers.
